






How long have you been practicing? 40 years.

MARY SAMPLASKI, MD

Associate Professor of Clinical Urology Institute of Urology University of Southern California, Los Angeles, CA

How long have you been practicing? I started on faculty at USC Urology in June 2014; 7 years... time flies.

What drew you to the field of Andrology? So many aspects of clinical Andrology are appealing to me both personally and professionally. I tend to be somewhat detail-oriented, so microsurgical vasectomy reversals appeal to my need for perfect anastomoses. I find the interplay of genetic,

hormonal, lab and ethical aspects of andrology, endlessly fascinating. I also enjoy the highly personalized nature of Andrology- each patient has a unique set of circumstances and goals that I strive to meet. And (most importantly), nothing beats the joy that I feel when I hear that one of my patients has achieved a pregnancy or live birth... that is what keeps me feeling motivated about coming to work every day.

What keeps you excited about the field of Andrology? Andrology is a relatively young specialty. There is so much potential for growth, and hope for new developments and that is exciting. Looking a semen analysis, I know that it is so rudimentary... there is so much that happens with sperm function that we do yet know or understand, and knowing that potential is invigorating. It is an exciting time to be a reproductive urologist.

If you had a magic wand, what is one thing you would change to make the lives of the people you work with better **overall?** Give all of my patients (that desire) both sperm that work and live births.

What types of activities do you do outside of the clinic? I enjoy puzzles of all kinds: escape rooms, board games, whodunnit shows. I also enjoy scuba diving, and one of the best memories of my life was having a pod of wild dolphins join us for a drift dive in Rangiroa (too bad USC does not have a urology satellite there).

What types of activities do you do outside of the clinic? I love orangetheory, and yoga. I'm a big foodie so I love to try new restaurants and I can't wait to be able to adventure in the world again soon!



Clinical Fellow, REI Department of Obstetrics & Gynecology Washington University School of Medicine St Louis, MO

How long have you been practicing? I am currently in my third year of Reproductive Endocrinology and Infertility (REI) fellowship after completing four years of Obstetrics and Gynecology residency. It takes seven years of training after medical school to become a reproductive endocrinologist! I'm excited to finish up the end of my training in June.

What drew you to the field of Andrology? REI fellowship is actually 18 months of research and 18 months of clinical training. I was attracted to Dr. Celia Santi's lab because I find sperm to be fascinating. There has to be more to assessing the male side of fertility than completing a standard semen analysis! The fact that her lab studies channels that may play a role in the ability of sperm to fertilize an egg was and still is very interesting to me.

What keeps you excited about the field of Andrology? The male side of fertility is understudied compared to the female side in the field of REI – the idea that what we are doing could help more people with infertility to get pregnant by as a result of our research keeps me going.

If you had a magic wand, what is one thing you would change to make the lives of the people you work with better overall? Have COVID disappear!

What types of activities do you do outside of the clinic? I enjoy spending time with my husband and two little kids. We love going to the parks and farmers markets in St. Louis. I also enjoy riding my peloton and crafting (knitting, quilting and using the cricut).





THE ASA IMPACT AWARD

This new Major Award recognizes long-standing, current ASA members (10 years or more) who, in the course of their careers, make tangible, "real world" contributions to the solution of longstanding problems or needs in the field of Andrology. The emphasis is on translation of research (whether their own or that of others) into actions that protect and/or enhance male reproductive health. Such contributions may include one or more of the following:

- Design, development and approval of new diagnostic methods, therapeutics, and products
- Advocacy for and passage of new regulations, policies and practices (biomedical, public health, environmental, etc)
- Development and delivery of education and outreach of relevance to Andrology

The nomination package should consist of 1 nominating letter (from an ASA member), the nominee's cv, and a Nomination Statement (maximum 4 pages; content detailed below), sent as a single pdf (in designated order) to the Chair of the Awards Committee, Kate Loveland.

Nomination Statements (no longer than 4 pages total) should include the following information and may include letters from the users and/or beneficiaries of the contribution.

- The context within which the individual worked, to include: governmental agency, industry, public health advocacy (e.g. non-governmental organizations or other), or academia
- The nature of the contribution(s)
- The real-world impact of the achievements


The deadline for this year's call for 2022 nominations is November 10th, 5:00pm ET (US).
